Mary Brown Collection



The artifacts in this collection hold a surprising find: three obsidian tools. This rare material is uncommon in lowa sites, as it was only obtainable through long-distance travel or trade. Four points in this collection are from the Early and Middle Woodland periods (about 500 BC – AD 300), a time of extensive trade networks and procurement of exotic goods. Coupled with the time period and material, this suggests the people whose materials made up this site were connected to the materially expressive Hopewell culture of the Eastern United States, or were at least taking advantage of that culture's influence to obtain rare, beautiful materials.
